The afternoon continues with oral abstracts, followed by the Chiva research plenary presenting research work that is currently underway. We will end the day by looking into the current global HIV funding environment, and how this is impacting the UK.

Poster presentations will be on display throughout the day, so please do take a moment to view the posters and find out about some other key research projects during your breaks.

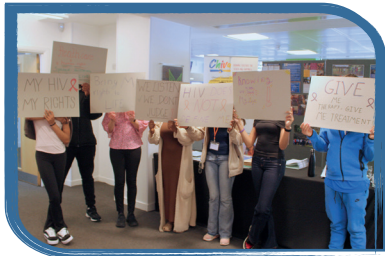

# SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES



**PROF JOHN FRATER** is a Professor of Infectious Diseases at the University of Oxford, where he leads the HIV Reservoir and Cure Group. The aim of his research is to explore strategies for targeting the reservoir of latent HIV infection in treated individuals, with a specific interest in primary HIV infection. He is a lead investigator on a number of major HIV clinical studies (eg RIO, AbVax, RIVER, HEATHER), many of which include antiretroviral therapy treatment interruptions. His laboratory focus is on immune responses that may lead to viral control and the impact of viral variation. He also clinically active as an Honorary Consultant Physician in the NHS in HIV and Infectious Diseases.



**PROFESSOR KEVIN FENTON CBE PhD FFPH FRCP** is the Regional Director for London in the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities; the statutory public health advisor to the Mayor of London and the Greater London Authority, and the Regional Director of Public Health for NHS London. In addition, he was the President of the UK Faculty of Public Health (2022-2025) and is the UK government's Chief Advisor on HIV and Chair of the HIV Action Plan Implementation Steering Group to oversee the delivery of the new HIV strategy for England.



**BAKITA KASADHA** is a health researcher, writer and poet whose work bridges lived experience, health research and creative practice. She is an NIHR Doctoral Research Fellow at the University of Oxford, where her research focuses on lived experience and peer researchers in sensitive health research, including HIV.

Bakita has worked extensively in HIV research and advocacy, particularly focused on young people, women and families, including work on HIV and infant feeding. She uses arts-based methods and poetry to explore identity, power and health experiences. Her poem 'Numbers Game (our silence won't protect us)' helped catalyse a multi-million-pound fund to prevent HIV and support people living with HIV.

# SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES



**PROF DIANA GIBB** is a paediatrician and Professor of Epidemiology and Clinical Trials at the Medical Research Council Clinical Trials Unit at University College London (MRC CTU at UCL). Over a career spanning more than 30 years, she has led global clinical trials and cohort studies in childhood infectious diseases. Her work began in paediatric HIV in Europe, where she founded and led early PENTA (Paediatric European Network for Treatment of AIDS) trials, while working at Great Ormond Street Hospital and establishing one of the UK's first family HIV clinics. She led research that underpinned the introduction of universal antenatal HIV testing in the UK and Ireland.

Since 2000, she has coordinated multi-country trials across Africa and Asia, expanding into malaria, sepsis, pneumonia and paediatric tuberculosis. She has over 500 publications, is Vice-Chair of the PENTA Foundation Board, a Fellow of the UK Academy of Medical Sciences, and received an honorary doctorate from York University in 2019.



**DR MARIANA MĂRDĂRESCU** graduated the Institute of Medicine and Pharmacy Bucharest "Carol Davila" Bucharest. In 1982 she became Assistant Professor at Pharmacology and Infectious Diseases Department and in 1985 Senior Doctor in Infectious Diseases and Epidemiology, with a focus on Paediatric Infectious Diseases. In 1991 she entered "Prof. Dr. Matei Bals" Institute as Consultant in Infectious Diseases.

Since 1990, Dr. Mărdărescu has dedicated her activity to PLWHIV, especially children from the 1988-1990 Romanian cohort. Her activity led to her PhD in HIV, in 2006. She ran the Paediatric HIV Department for 30 years and continues to monitor the HIV phenomenon at national level.

She represents Romania at ECDC as National HIV/AIDS Focal Point (ongoing representation). In 2016 she was elected EACS country representative until 2020, followed by WAVE Steering Group. In 2016 she joined the Euroguidelines in Central and Eastern Europe (ECEE) Network Group and in April 2024 was elected member of European HIV Outcome's Steering Group and re-elected in 2025.



**DR ALLISON AGWU** M.D., ScM is Professor of Adult and Pediatric Infectious Diseases at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in Baltimore, Maryland, USA. Dually boarded in both adult and pediatric infectious diseases, Dr. Agwu cares for patients across the age spectrum, both in the pediatric and adult Ryan-White funded multi-disciplinary HIV clinics at Johns Hopkins, as the founder and medical director of the Accessing Care Early (ACE) Clinic and the Program Director of the Pediatric/Adolescent HIV/AIDS Program. Both her clinical care and research focus on deciphering health disparities and optimizing care, treatment strategies, and management approaches, including access to novel strategies for young people with HIV. She is a member of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Adolescent and Adult Antiretroviral Treatment Guidelines and past Chair of the HIV Medicine Association Board of Directors, where she continuously advocates for the unique needs of young people.



**PROF RASHIDA ABBAS FERRAND** is Professor of International Health, London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine. Professor Ferrand is a clinician epidemiologist whose work focuses on adolescent health, HIV, sexual and reproductive health, and multimorbidity in low resource settings. She has led interventional studies aiming to improve outcomes across the HIV care cascade for adolescents and her research has informed adolescent HIV care and integration of sexual and reproductive health services. She studies HIV-associated non-infectious comorbidities in individuals growing up with perinatally-acquired HIV including cardiorespiratory, neurocognitive, musculoskeletal and skin disease.

For the past two decades she has lived and worked in Zimbabwe where she established an interdisciplinary research programme embedded within the Biomedical Research and Training Institute, a not-for-profit research institution. Rashida is Director of the CREATE PhD programme, that trains UK and African health care professionals in global health.

# SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES



**DR MERLE HENDERSON** is an Academic Clinical Lecturer in HIV and Genitourinary Medicine at Imperial College London and Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust. Current research focuses include brain health in people with HIV and long-term clinical outcomes for those with perinatal HIV. She is an editorial fellow at *BMJ Sexually Transmitted Infections*. Dr Henderson qualified from the University of Manchester in 2014. She has subsequently worked in general and HIV Medicine in the UK and South Africa. She is working on several clinical trials in HIV and Genitourinary Medicine at the St Mary's Hospital Clinical Trials Centre.



**LISA LANG** is a Specialist Support Officer at Chiva, providing individual and family based emotional and social support, advocacy, and HIV education to children, young people and young adults living with HIV. She works closely with paediatric, adolescent, and adult HIV clinic teams across the London region. Lisa has a background in social work, advocacy, mental health support and extensive experience of working with community-based organisations.



**REBECCA FERGUSON** is an Infectious Diseases Clinical Nurse Specialist, currently based at St Mary's Hospital nursing in both the Family Clinic and the 900 Clinic providing holistic family and person-centred care to people living with HIV. She has an extensive background of working in emergency nursing and Global health with a particular interest in refugee and migrant health.



**KATIE WARBURTON** is a Senior Lecturer in Children and Young People's Nursing at the University of Lancashire. Katie has extensive clinical experience, having worked for many years as an Infectious Diseases Clinical Nurse Specialist across two NHS Trusts in the North-West of England, where she has worked with children, young people, and families living with HIV. She has also contributed to national research as a Research Nurse on studies including the AALPHI study.

Her research interests focus on paediatric HIV care, stigma, child health, and the use of arts based and narrative methodologies. Katie's PhD research has a particular emphasis on how and when children are told their HIV diagnosis.



**EMANUELA ACKON** is a Specialist Support Officer at Chiva, providing emotional and social support, advocacy, and age appropriate HIV education to children, young people, and families living with HIV, working collaboratively with HIV clinics across London.

Emanuela is actively involved in the development and delivery of projects and educational initiatives that strengthen support for children and young people living with HIV. Alongside her role at Chiva, she practises as a paediatric nurse.



**ALEXANDRA THOMAS-LEECH** is a Specialist HIV Midwife in Manchester, with over 10 years of experience supporting women living with HIV throughout their pregnancy journey. Her work is rooted in compassionate, evidence-based care and a strong commitment to reducing HIV-related stigma within healthcare settings.

Alexandra is particularly passionate about empowering women to overcome self-stigma and to experience pregnancy as a positive and celebrated chapter of their lives, rather than one overshadowed by their medical condition. She advocates for care that places the woman - not HIV - at the centre of maternity services. Through multidisciplinary collaboration, education, and advocacy, Alexandra strives to create safer, more informed healthcare environments where women feel respected, confident, and fully supported.

# SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES



**ALEXANDRA DAVID** is a Surveillance Officer with the Integrated Screening Outcomes Surveillance Service (ISOSS) and the Children's HIV and AIDS Reporting System (CHARS), based at the Great Ormond Street Institute of Child Health in University College London (UCL). In addition, she is a PhD student at the Institute for Global Health at UCL, researching the vaginal microbiome composition and its association with urogenital symptoms among women in Britain.



**GABRIELA TOLEDO** is a Research Fellow in Epidemiology at the MRC Clinical Trials Unit at UCL, specialising in paediatric infectious diseases. Her research focuses on children and young people affected by HIV and other infections, with a particular interest in long-term outcomes and the use of routine health data. She is co-leading the conceptualisation of a life course study involving people living with perinatally-acquired HIV in England, using national HIV surveillance and other administrative data through the Collaborative HIV Paediatric (CHIPS) Study, working closely with key stakeholders. Gabriela contributes to international paediatric HIV research via the Epidemiology of Pregnancy and Paediatric Infections International Cohort Collaboration. She also provides epidemiological support to projects within HDR UK Transforming Health Systems Data for Trials Programme and the International Severe Acute Respiratory and Emerging Infection Consortium.



**JESSICA GLENN** is a final-year medical student at Imperial College London with a focus on infectious diseases, particularly HIV. She began her research journey with her intercalated BSc in Reproductive Medicine, studying drug resistance in a perinatal HIV cohort, and has since collaborated with Dr Caroline Foster and the Paediatric HIV team at St Mary's Hospital on work published in AIDS and Open Forum in Infectious Diseases.



**PROF ALI JUDD** is Professor of Epidemiology at UCL, and Global Health and Epidemiology Lead at Penta. Her main interests are in paediatric infections (including HIV, hepatitis, COVID-19 and RSV) and also pandemic preparedness. She co-leads cohort collaborations in paediatric and pregnancy infections across Europe and globally.



**PROF JEANNIE COLLINS** is a Professor of Epidemiology at University College London. She has worked in HIV research for over 20 years, initially in Thailand (where she is originally from) and then in the UK and has worked on multiple international collaborative studies. She is the co-principal investigator of the paediatric component of the European Pregnancy and Paediatric Infections Cohort Collaboration.



**DR KATJA DOERHOLT** works mainly as a paediatric Infectious Diseases Consultant at St. George's University Hospital, London. Her main interest is looking after the health and wellbeing of children, young people and families living with HIV and has been leading the service at St. George's University Hospital for many years. She is also working as a clinical trials physician at the UCL Medical Research Council Clinical Trials Unit.



**PROF MARYAM SHAHMANESH** is a Physician Scientist, a NIHR Global Research Professor at University College London, and faculty at the Africa Health Research Institute, South Africa. She leads interdisciplinary research to co-create and evaluate biosocial interventions for adolescents and young adults. She has conducted trials of decentralised models of delivering differentiated HIV prevention and Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP). She is currently leading the UNITAID funded ACCEL consortium to accelerate the delivery of Lenacapavir through peer-led support of a choice of product through a choice of decentralised venues for key and priority. She serves on a range of national and international guideline and funding committees and actively engages in mentoring the next generation of South African scientists.
